# Closing the loop: 2023 Vanuatu Dual Cyclone Emergency (March 2023)






### Research and resources for humanitarian response in real time

Research and resources to guide humanitarian response are not always at our fingertips at the moment we need them most – when a crisis hits. Working with our partners, we want to support the sector with at-a-glance information and links that can play a small part in 'closing the loop' between research and practice in real time.

## **©** QUICK SNAPSHOT

- Vanuatu has been impacted by two category four Tropical
   Cyclones (TC), and two earthquakes of 6.6 and 5.4 magnitude.
- Approximately **80% of the population** or 251,319 people have been impacted. About half of these or 125,500 are children.<sup>1</sup>
- Running water is not available in the main affected areas and rivers have been contaminated by debris.
- Hospitals and other medical facilities have been damaged affecting the availability of medical supplies and access to medical care.<sup>2</sup>
- ► Electricity and communications systems have been severely damaged by winds and floodwater.<sup>3</sup>
- ► Farmers have reported **major damage to crops** which is likely to cause long-term food shortages.<sup>4</sup>

## RESPONSE AND COORDINATION

Overall response being led by Government of Vanuatu coordinated by the National Disaster Management Office (NDMO). A State of Emergency is in effect for the entire country to enable response and coordination.

Pacific Humanitarian Team, comprising of UN agencies, INGOs and the IFRC supporting and working with NDMO to deliver support.

Local NGOs and CSOs along with <u>Vanuatu Red Cross</u> have been responding on the ground through available resources and networks.

The <u>FRANZ arrangement</u> has been activated with Australia, France and New Zealand deploying naval and aerial assets and

The <u>FRANZ arrangement</u> has been activated with Australia, France and New Zealand deploying naval and aerial assets and personnel to support with immediate response activities in coordination with the Government of Vanuatu.

Multi-sectoral rapid assessments have been completed and response plan is being finalised.
