Protection of Civilians

- International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) Geneva Convention (IV) on the Protection of Civilians specifies the relevant protections afforded to civilians during conflict
- Political Declaration on Strengthening the Protection of Civilians from the Humanitarian Consequences Arising from the Use of Explosive Weapons in Populated Areas – adopted and endorsed by 83 States in November 2022
- ICRC International Humanitarian Law and the Challenges of Contemporary Armed Conflicts provides information on the protections afforded to civilians from the use of new technologies in armed conflicts
- From Principle to Practice: Protecting civilians in violent contexts: a field handbook provides practice examples and tools for building the protection of civilians into both humanitarian and military operations.
- Norwegian Refugee Council Principles under Pressure provides information on counterterrorism measures and how they impact the delivery of humanitarian services

International Humanitarian Law

- ICRC Customary International Humanitarian Law Database provides a database on all customary humanitarian laws including those regarding the distinction of civilians
- United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs Compilation of military policy and practice – specifies the particular rules relating to the use of explosive weapons in populated areas and the humanitarian implications of such acts

Protected Groups

- Healthcare in Danger an initiative that supports advocacy and resources to protect health-care workers and facilities
- ICRC Addressing the Needs of Women Affected by Armed Conflict aimed at raising awareness of how women are affected by armed conflict and what protections are provided to them
- Office of the SRSG for Children in Armed Conflict action to strengthen the protection of children affected by armed conflict, raise awareness and promote information gathering about the plight of children affected by war
- International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies Effective Law and Policy on Gender Equality and Protection from Sexual and Gender-based Violence in Disasters – seeks to provide national law recommendations focusing on protecting and responding to sexual and gender-based violence
- ICRC Oxford Guidance on the Law Relating to Humanitarian Relief Operations in Situations of Armed Conflict – provides information on the relevant laws designed to allow the delivery of humanitarian assistance during armed conflicts
